HELPING STUDENTS PURSUE THEIR DREAMS

Teachers understand that, for students to be successful in the classroom, it is imperative they create a stimulating and well-equipped learning environment that motivates everyone in the class and tailors to different learning styles and needs. These days, technological equipment plays a large role in helping students succeed.

Brittany Kaelin, a first year 4th grade teacher at Avondale Meadows Academy, felt the lack of laptops available to students in her classroom hampered her students' progress. Brittany mentioned this to her parents, Larry and Colleen Kaelin, and they decided to take it upon themselves to raise funds to buy Chromebooks for Brittany's class. Larry and Colleen began contacting friends and family and asked them to consider contributing \$250 each or enough to buy one Chromebook for the classroom. Within a

few weeks, more than **23 people** responded and contributed more than **\$7,000** in total—enough to buy **26 Chromebooks and a charging station!**

On Friday, March 8th, the Kaelins visited the AMA 4th grade classroom to meet the students. In recognition of their generosity, the students presented the Kaelins with thank you cards and took pictures with the couple.

Introducing the Eagle Ambassadors!

Under the direction of Jeremiah Lockett, Avondale Meadows Middle School's (AMMS) Assistant Principal, the Eagle Ambassador Program has been created as a student leadership and service opportunity. Recently, sixteen 6th through 8th grade students were accepted into its inaugural class.

To apply, students submit an application that includes a resume, recommendation letters, and referrals. Students must obtain at least a 3.0 grade point average and maintain an exceptional attendance and discipline record. A team of school administrators evaluated credentials and interviewed all of the candidates before selecting the first students for the program.

Eagle Ambassadors perform several important duties, including running morning announcements; leading guest tours of the school; participating in service projects; creating the AMMS yearbook; staffing enrollment, parent, and special events; and managing fundraising activities.

Are you a College Champion?

USI is committed to equipping students with the academic skills, the desire, and the stamina they need to be successful in our nation's colleges and universities.

Each year, all students (Kindergarten through 8th grades) visit a college campus. College exposure helps motivate students to work hard to achieve their educational goals. We want our students to see, feel, and live college life for a day. For kindergarteners, we try to familiarize them with what a college is and why they should go. Our 8th graders take out of town trips and explore questions such as, "how do I complete a college application?" and, "how do I apply for scholarships?"

Last year, students traveled to IUPUI, Marion, Franklin, Anderson, DePauw, Purdue University, Notre Dame, and Indiana University. Recent out of town trips included Northwestern, Louisville, and University of Chicago. Local trips cost approximately \$1,000, and out of town visits (including food and lodging) can cost as much as \$5,000.

CHARTER SCHOOLS 101

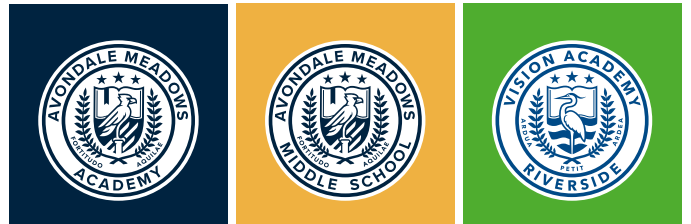
The term "charter schools" is thrown around a lot these days, but it's become clear that many people aren't 100% clear on what a charter school actually is. Are they public? Are they private? Are they part of a school district? How do they get their funding? All excellent questions!

Charter Schools are independent public schools allowed the freedom to be innovative while still being held accountable for improved student achievement. United Schools of Indianapolis (USI) is a network of K-8 public charter schools authorized by the Indianapolis Mayor's Office of Education Innovation.

CHARTER SCHOOLS ARE:

- Public schools, but operate independently of a school district
- Tuition-free and open to any scholar who wishes to enroll
- Non-sectarian and do not discriminate on any basis
- Publicly funded by local, state, and federal tax dollars based on enrollment (same as how other public schools operate)
- Held accountable to state and federal academic standards

THE NUMBERS

Charter schools receive state funding on a per-pupil basis, but gets 1/3 less than a public school would receive for that same student. The difference is that charter schools do not receive funds for transportation or capital improvement projects. As a result, there is a significant gap between state funding received and the cost of USI's enriched model.

United Schools of Indianapolis created a Development Office to help address this funding gap. The 2019 goal is to raise \$400,000 which will be used to greatly enhance the educational experience at our schools. This funding will provide additional intervention teachers in the classroom, physical education instruction, important classes such as art, music, and theater, and annual field trips.
