

Finance Committee Brief:

Financial Statement Summary For Period Ending December 31, 2021



REVENUE:

- State Basic Support is reconciled to Sept ADM count x actual per pupil

Finance Committee - HVAC Recommendation

At 16 years old, AMA is in need of a new HVAC system. This is the ideal time to purchase a new system as we can use the federal ESSER funds to support this upgrade. At the recommendation of Bill McCarthy, we hired a mechanical engineer from Freije Engineered Solutions (FES) to help us determine the right type of HVAC system needed. We currently contract with FES for our Preventative Maintenance agreements at all three schools and are extremely satisfied with the services received.

Carvis provided the mechanical drawings of the building and did a walkthrough of the building with their engineers and techs and was able to identify for them the areas that work well and those that are troublesome in our current system. They concluded that we need new units and controls but the duct work we have in place is 95% effective. They also discussed pros and cons of the different types of systems available and the long-term costs associated with each.



In the end, the system we installed when building AMMS is ultimately what we want to put in AMA. The cost of the units are not the cheapest but rather are "best value". The maintenance required is basic which would not require specialized technicians for maintenance in years to come.

The FES mechanical engineer drafted an RFP for us to post on our website and distribute to three specific contractors, allowing for an apples-to-apples bid. Of the three, only two responded with a bid. Both bids were comparable and seemed extremely knowledgeable and competent. FES provided the lowest cost.

It is our recommendation that we contract with Freije Engineered Services to replace the HVAC system at AMA. The total cost of the project is currently quoted at \$544K. Once we sign the contract, FES can begin ordering the equipment and give us a timeline of what to expect. Currently, the lead time on equipment is ~ 16 weeks. We included \$200k for the capital expense in the FY22 budget and will include the remaining \$325K in FY23. We have confirmed with Greenwalt that we are allowed to split the expense over two fiscal years, based on how the project unfolds.

MOTION: Motion to approve the contract to replace the HVAC system at AMA, as presented. Bill Harris made the motion, Aaron Williamson seconded. Motion carried.

Development Committee:

Year End Giving

USI received several year-end contributions totaling \$114,500. The largest contribution was from the Perkins Malo Hunter Foundation for \$100,000.

16 Tech Grant

Vision Academy received a \$15,000 grant from 16 Tech to provide STEM programming during the summer and after-school. 16 Tech is and "innovation district" located in the Riverside Community and strives to bring together entrepreneurs, academics, startups, corporations, and community members in a single place dedicated to collaboration and creative problem-solving. 16 Tech established a Community Investment Fund to ensure access, opportunity and revitalization of neighborhoods near 16 Tech Innovation District.

With this grant Vision Academy plans to expand its out-of-school programming during the school year to include unique STEM classes like "Code Black Coding and Creators Camp: Experimental STEAM Learning" for 3rd through 8th grade students. The goal of this project is to introduce new science, technology, engineering and math concepts to our students and empower them with the skills to succeed and adapt to this increasingly complex, changing, technological world.

The *Building Minds...Changing Lives Gala* will be held at Vision Academy on Thursday, May 12. This exciting evening celebrates our incredible teachers and amazing students, and honors Rose Mays with the USI "Making a Difference" Community Service Award. Proceeds will enhance USI's academic programming, and attendees have an opportunity to help our students by supporting specific projects at our schools.

Academic Committee:

Avondale Campus Restructure:

For the 2022-23 school year we propose that a restructure of the grade configuration at the Avondale Meadows campus.

- AMA Kindergarten 4th
- AMMS 5th 8th
- 1. The complexity of the state standards continues to increase each year. The intermediate model allows:
 - 5th grade students an academic model that provides explicit instruction in Science and Social Studies
 - o Teachers to develop content expertise in one content area
- 2. Provides students with gradual release of transitions to better prepare them for the middle school model
- 3. Network model is consistent across campuses:
 - o Elementary: K-4
 - Middle School: 5-8
- 4. AMMS increased enrollment will allow the school to hire additional intervention and elective staff
- 5. AMA will have additional space and can begin exploring a Pre-K option to increase enrollment campus wide.

MOTION: Motion to approve the restructuring of the Avondale Meadows campus, as presented. Mike Mason made the motion, Madeline Priest seconded. Motion carried.

2022-23 School Calendar

The most significant changes to the proposed 22-23 school calendar are:

- 2 Parent/Teacher Conference Days become asynchronous learning days
 - Students will take home laptops/work packets
- 2 less days in teacher contract total: 191 average = 190
