- Audit Results - Jennifer McVey from Barnes Dennig CPA's presented the FY25 Audit results. Once again, there were no matters to be reported due to compliance issues, internal control issues or findings in the financial statements. This was another clean audit!

**MOTION: Motion to approve the FY25 Audited Financial Statements, as presented.**

- Health Insurance Premiums – IU Health is getting out of the insurance business so USI will switch to Anthem for employee coverage. We are still negotiating rates but it looks as if there will be little to no increase in premiums. Unfortunately, we do need to increase the employee portion of the premiums. Janie and Mr. Adamson are still working to finalized the amounts. Open Enrollment begins after Thanksgiving so all of the details will be worked out by then and communicated to the staff. We are pleased with the both the policies and premiums proposed.
- Budget Modifications - The Finance Team continues to work through the current budget, presenting multiple scenarios to help finish stronger this fiscal year.
  - We are expecting to hear if we have been awarded the \$3.75M grant from Lilly.
  - We have made a few personnel reductions simply by not filling open positions, thus keeping us from cutting anyone from our current staff.
  - We have cut expenses and secured additional funding in a variety of ways, all allowing us to help the bottom line.
  - This is a moving target with new factors to consider daily. Mr. Adamson, is evaluating the Lilly budget that was submitted with the grant application to ensure the staffing matches the program.

**Basis for Rating/Additional Details**

During the 2024-25 school year, Avondale Meadows Academy, Avondale Meadows Middle School, and Vision Academy were overseen by United Schools of Indianapolis' (USI) eight-member nonprofit board.

The board maintained a total of four committees, including governance, finance, development, and academics. The full board met bi-monthly, while committees met on the off months and all reported out at each board meeting.

All required evaluations were completed and submitted.

<p>In the 2024-25 school year, USI began the year with eight board members with backgrounds in finance, academics, HR, and more. Two board members were added, while one board member rolled off. Overall, the board’s composition reflected the student population in both demographics and skill sets but would benefit from adding a board member with a legal background to replace the background of the board member who rolled off.</p> <p>The board met quorum at 100% of board meetings with a representative of each committee present at every board meeting. Although the board had a dashboard to monitor network-wide goals, it was not actively maintained by the full board beyond school-level participation. <p>USI's overall on-time compliance submission rate is determined by dividing the total number of compliance items due throughout the year by the school's total on-time document submissions. The network achieved a submission rate of 96%.</p> <p>USI had a Notice of Deficiency issued during the 2022-23 school year for AMA and AMMS based on academic performance. The required actions were then updated during the 2023-24 school year, and those actions are still ongoing. USI did not experience any material incidents and upheld regular communication with OEI in addition to scheduled meetings.
